Columbus Day

A U.S. national holiday since 1937, Columbus Day commemorates the arrival of Christopher Columbus in the New World on October 12, 1492. The Italian-born explorer had set sail two months earlier, backed by the Spanish monarchs King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella. He intended to chart a western sea route to China, India and the



fabled gold and spice islands of Asia; instead, he landed in the Bahamas, becoming the first European to explore the Americas since the Vikings set up colonies in Greenland and Newfoundland during the 10th century.

Contrary to popular belief, most educated Europeans in Columbus' day understood that the world was round, but they did not yet know that the Pacific Ocean existed. As a result, Columbus and his contemporaries assumed that only the Atlantic lay between Europe and the riches of the East Indies.

Later that month, Columbus sighted Cuba and believed it was mainland China; in December the expedition found Hispaniola, which he though might be Japan. There, he established Spain's first colony in the Americas with 39 of his men. In March 1493, the explorer returned to Spain in triumph, bearing gold, spices and "Indian" captives. He crossed the Atlantic several more times before his death in 1506; by his third journey, he realized that he hadn't reached Asia but instead had stumbled upon a continent previously unknown to Europeans.

Columbus Day in the United States

The first Columbus Day celebration took place in 1792, when New York's Columbian Order–better known as Tammany Hall–held an event to commemorate the historic landing's 300th anniversary. Taking pride in Columbus' birthplace and faith, Italian and Catholic communities in various parts of the country began organizing annual religious ceremonies and parades in his honor. In 1892, President Benjamin Harrison issued a proclamation encouraging Americans to mark the 400th anniversary of Columbus' voyage with patriotic festivities, writing, "On that day let the people, so far as possible, cease from toil and devote themselves to such exercises as may best express honor to the discoverer and their appreciation of the great achievements of the four completed centuries of American life."

In 1937, President Franklin D. Roosevelt proclaimed Columbus Day a national holiday, largely as a result of intense lobbying by the Knights of Columbus, an influential Catholic fraternal benefits organization. Originally observed every October 12, it was fixed to the second Monday in October in 1971.

Halloween Superstitions

Halloween has always been a holiday filled with mystery, magic and superstition. It began as a Celtic end-of-summer festival during which people felt especially deceased close to relatives and friends. these friendly For spirits, they set places at the dinner table, left treats on doorsteps and



along the side of the road and lit candles to help loved ones find their way back to the spirit world. Today's Halloween ghosts are often depicted as more fearsome and malevolent, and our customs and superstitions are scarier too. We avoid crossing paths with black cats, afraid that they might bring us bad luck. This idea has its roots in the Middle Ages, when many people believed that witches avoided detection by turning themselves into cats. We try not to walk under ladders for the same reason. This superstition may have come from the ancient Egyptians, who believed that triangles were sacred; it also may have something to do with the fact that walking under a leaning ladder tends to be fairly unsafe. And around Halloween, especially, we try to avoid breaking mirrors, stepping on cracks in the road or spilling salt.

17, the City Charter amendment that created the
Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transportation, they were

agency that would be independent of political

It seems that distinction has been violated by the Caldwell administration, HART and Pacific Resource Partnership ("HART, advocates keep in sync to promote rail-tax extension," Star-Advertiser, Aug. 16). Discussing legislative tactics and strategizing by HART with a group that greatly influenced the 2012 mayoral election would seem to be not only unethical but possibly illegal in that it violates the charter amendment.

Why don't the city and HART just appoint PRP union leaders to the HART board so they can run the project directly without having to go through a middleman?

In June 2015, attempts were made to muzzle the city Ethics Commission Executive Director Chuck Totto, requiring that he not deal with the media without permission.

The only solution is for the Star-Advertiser to hire a full-time reporter to monitor city and state ethics and campaignspending violations and accurately report the information so the voters can decide.

Cost of rail construction impossible to calculate

Anyone interested in seeing what rail construction will do to a community should come into Waipahu and Pearl City to see the devastation of businesses and the traffic jams created.

Cliff Slater pinpointed the huge cost overruns of rail ("Where are we with rail? Way over budget, as predicted," Star-Advertiser, Island Voices, Aug. 19) but the true costs cannot even be calculated. It will disrupt hundreds of businesses and cost thousands of hours for motorists stuck in construction traffic.

The City Council proposed legislation to mitigate costs to businesses due to construction of the project. The problem is it did not specify how much and where the money will come from.

As Slater pointed out, rail will remove two of every 100 cars coming from West Oahu, assuming no more housing development such as Hoʻopili, which will add 11 000 homes

It seems like Slater's predictions were right on the money.
