Bryan loves football and basketball and could use a new football, as his is getting too old to use. He loves everything that has to do with monsters, like Harry Potter and TMNT. He could really use new shoes right now since he just had to throw out his old shoes due to the fact that they were falling apart. Both of the kids love reading and would love to get new books to read.

This family is very humble and doesn't expect much, but could really use some kokua this holiday season.






